Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) knows NO boundaries

In Australia approximately 30,000 people each year sustain a Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) outside of a hospital and are treated by emergency medical services (EMS).

That's 575 Australians suffering a SCA every week and ONLY 1 out of 10 WILL SURVIVE!



The Facts

- On average, only 10% of SCA victims in Australia survive
- It can happen anytime, anywhere and to anyone... even fit young athletes.
- Early defibrillation is the single most effective treatment for SCA
- Defibrillation within three minutes of collapse can increase the chance of survival to over 70%

Are YOU READY, WILLING and ABLE to potentially SAVE a LIFE in your own Community?

Our Heart Safe Home Community Program initiative was created to raise awareness and education about the very important **3-STEPS** to potentially save a life during a Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) and about the vital function that defibrillators (AED) can perform in potentially saving lives in communities across Australia.

Defibrillators are basically a 'Doctor in a Box', analysing the patient's condition and providing guidance for CPR and importantly shocking the patient to re-start the heart if required.

Whether you are familiar with the 3-Steps to save a life and already have a defibrillator or AED, join our Heart Safe Community program initiative to make sure you and the people in your community are READY, WILLING and ABLE to help in potentially very stressful life and death situations.

Heart Safe Community Checklist to potentially Save Lives in Communities

Audit/Check List to become a Heart Safe Community

- There is a Defibrillator in the Community environment with appropriate signage
- The Defibrillator is in a high traffic area and is highly visible
- There is a Defibrillator located within a 90 second brisk walk from anywhere within your Community.
- There is an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) Policy & Procedure available to responsible staff and they are aware of it.
- There is adequate and highly visible CPR signage
- All main staff must have CPR awareness training
